

8th Grade Catapult Projects

The 8th Grade students have been studying kinds of energy and energy conversion. Not only have they been focusing on identifying energy sources such as mechanical, solar, electrical, atomic, and gravitational, but they have also been working on converting energy from one source to another. In this specific activity, students were challenged to create a catapult that could store potential energy and convert enough kinetic energy to launch a projectile 8, 10, or 12 meters, while hitting a target.

The length they were required to reach was based on whether they worked individually, in partners, or with a group.

Students built the catapults and created a detailed experiment report showing the purpose, hypotheses, variables (dependent, independent, and controlled) variables, results, and conclusion of their experiment.


2nd Grade Outdoor Spelling
